It will also improve memory and concentration. You can learn a wide range of musical styles, with lots of opportunities to play in bands and develop relevant skills.

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Classical Guitar

The classical guitar is a nylon strung acoustic instrument originating from Spain. It has evolved over hundreds of years to its present form which appeared at the end of the 19th Century. Despite its name, a wide range of music is played on the instrument. In Spain and Latin America it is the folk instrument of choice. The classical guitar makes a warm, rich sound and is played solo or in ensemble. The classical guitar is played exclusively with the fingers and not a pick. Students will learn how to read and interpret music from a wide range of genres and periods. This instrument demands great skill in both hands so will help to develop coordination. It will also improve memory and concentration and you will be introduced to a wide range of cultures. The softer strings of the classical guitar make it the ideal starting point for young children.

The ukulele is a small guitar-like instrument introduced to Hawaii by Portuguese immigrants. Now it is famous as the sound of hula-girls and palm trees! In recent years many bands and singer-songwriters have started to make use of its distinctive sound. Ukulele lessons can be either in groups or individual. You will learn how to play a variety of chords and how to accompany yourself and others singing. Learning the ukulele improves memory and refines coordination. This instrument introduces you to other cultures, and is versatile as it can be used in many different styles. Ukuleles are also very portable so can be practised anywhere.
